

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y ist and has also been a wild bird rehabber for 20 years.

**Inspirationally,** my most memorable book is *The Snow Goose* by Paul Gallico which I read when a girl. I was taken with the goose more than the characters, and \( \text{how kindness to animals can interweave in } \) relationships in emotional and practical ways. My first clay form made 20 years ago was one of Frith holding the goose, similar to the picture on the cover of the w original book. (I still have this piece. It <sup>∀</sup> looks primitive compared to recent works



but is a gentle reminder of how beginnings can develop.)

Creatively, a book that excitedly opened up my sculpting interest was one I found at the Taupo Library called *Modelling the Figure in Clay* by Bruno Lucchesi. I used it as a teaching tool and, through his images and \(\psi\) instruction, taught myself to create female figures and faces in clay. I was a regular at the library looking for books on clay sculpting tutorials. The Interloan library service supported my search and I was able to source Lucchesi's other two books as well as Modelling a Likeness in Clay by Daisy Grubbs, and many more.

**Philosophically,** On Death and Dying by Elisabeth Kübler-Ross, a Swiss-American psychiatrist who was a pioneer in near-death studies. I've read all her books and listened to her lectures on tape. The book I value the most is To Live Until We Say Good-bye which to me is not so w much about dying but about living and making the most of our moments v shared or alone. All the Kübler-Ross books I read were sourced from <sup>↑</sup> Taupo Library until I bought my own.

## Interloan

Did you know you can borrow books from other library systems? Here's what you do: Come into the library and fill out an Interloan form. It costs \$3 for the service. When the item is found and arrives in Taupo, the borrower then has to pay another \$5 to cover the postage for when the Interloan is returned to the lending library.

## Justice of the Peace is in the house



Here are just a few of the new and recent titles available in ebook form:



The Abduction of Smith & Smith: A Novel by Rashad Harrison. An historical story in which a confederate soldier arrives home to find his father has been murdered.

Billy Bathgate by EL Doctorow. The Spanish language version of this novel about a fifteen year old dropout who captures the attention of infamous gangster Dutch Schultz.

Helmand to the Himalayas: One Soldier's Inspirational Journey by David Wiseman. The story of the first soldier on the scene of one of the most devastating attacks on British soldiers in Afghanistan.



The Half-Gallon Quarter Acre Pavlova Paradise by Austin Mitchell

A satirical description of life and Kiwi culture in 1960s New Zealand.
