Taupō District's face of Civil Defence retires

One of the district's most recognisable personalities has stepped down from the role of Taupō District's emergency manager after nearly 30 years in Civil Defence-related roles.

Phil Parker left Taupō District Council last week and will be missed by many of his colleagues and people in the community.

His voice was a permanent fixture on local radio, imploring the community to be prepared for an emergency and inspiring action.

At 67, Phil says it is time to engage in more leisurely pursuits and he is retiring to coastal Bay of Plenty.

For his work in Civil Defence and the huge contribution he has made to the Taupō District, Phil received ministerial award from Civil Defence and Emergency Management Minister Nikki Kaye and an award from the Waikato Civil Defence

and Emergency Management Group. He was also presented a mayoral award for service to the community from Mayor David Trewayas.

Phil played an integral part in two statutory civil defence declarations and other events including the rescue of stranded motorists when Napier-Taupō Road was hit by heavy snow in 2009. He was also part of the emergency response team when the Te Maari crater erupted on Mount Tongariro in 2012.

Community risk, relations and support strategic manager Brian Fox said Phil had left a legacy and his shoes would be hard to fill.

"Phil worked tirelessly for our district to build a stronger, more resilient community and I think we have come an incredibly long way during his time in Civil Defence here," he said.

"His expertise will be greatly missed but we wish him all the best."









Shards of glass in recycling bin

A contractor needed five stitches in his leg after he was badly cut by broken glass left in a recycling bin last week.

We are using this as an opportunity to remind residents of their responsibilities when it comes to recycling. Glass and other sharp objects need to be wrapped in newspaper and put in a rubbish bag, not your recycling bin. This minimises the chance of our contractors getting hurt while doing their job each day.

The glass was sticking out of a recycling bin in Taupō and was not seen by the collector until it was too late. He was taken to hospital for treatment. The incident is the latest in a long line of similar incidents that had concerned our contractors, Envirowaste.

Stormwater and solid waste asset manager Brent Aitken said it was important the community took all the necessary steps to allow contractors to clear our waste and recycling safely.

"These guys work hard to clear our waste and recycling every day," he said. "If there are sharp objects lying around they are bound to get injured and we need to keep them safe."
