OPEPE WAKA PROJECT TAKES SHAPE



Stage one of the restoration project of the Opepe waka at Taupō Museum is now complete. After initially being discovered in Opepe, spending a lot of time outside in the weather, and then being housed in the museum, the waka is now undertaking a different journey - one of restoration.

Following initial consultation between iwi and museum staff the restorative process was agreed upon and, more importantly, the stabilisation of this Tūwharetoa taonga has progressed.

The first element involved the removal of lichen and bacterial growth and was completed ahead of schedule by conservator Rose Evans, with help from Tautahanga Rameka. The next steps are to fumigate the waka to avoid further potential damage. This will take place from May 20 for approximately five weeks, during which time this area of the museum will be closed.

A final decision from iwi regarding the nature of any possible repair work will be discussed and implemented following the restoration phase.

SECURING YOUR LOAD

You can be given an infringement notice (a ticket) for \$400 – or you can be fined up to \$1,000 if convicted of an insecure load, so let's keep it all strapped and secure and look after the place we love!
