RECYCLING #5 PL

THE COLLECTION OF number 5 plastics will resume in the district from Monday, providing the opportunity to save up to 35 tonnes of waste from landfill each year.

From February 1, number 5 plastics will join the currently collected numbers 1 and 2 plastics in our recycling regime.

Asset manager solid waste Brent Aitken said the ability for contractors to collect number 5 plastics meant great gains for the district.

"We have been lucky enough to find a New Zealand market for number 5 plastics, which will add a further 17 per cent to the volume of plastics currently recycled in our district," he said. "Plastic is light but it still takes up a huge amount of room in landfills so this will save space in our landfills and benefit the environment as a result."

The district was able to recycle all plastics numbered 1-7 until October 2018 when China restricted imports of recyclables, which meant the recycling of numbers 3-7 had to cease.

Mr Aitken said since then the team had been searching for alternative avenues to recycle these plastics to continue to reduce waste in the district.

He said there were some rules around what could be recycled only kitchen, laundry and bathroom number 5 plastics could be recycled, not outdoor plastics such as plant pots.

"We need to start small in this instance and see how well the recycling of this group of number 5 plastics goes before we can look to expand," he said. "The things that can be recycled include lots of single-use plastic such as yoghurt, hummus, icecream and takeaway containers that are number 5."

Mr Aitken wanted to remind people all containers needed to be thoroughly rinsed before being put out for collection to qualify for pick up.

"You can find the plastic type number in the recycling symbol on most plastics, usually on the bottom of the item, so make sure it's 1, 2 or 5," he said.



PHASE TWO OF **HOROMATANGI** ROUNDABOUT TO GET UNDERWAY

THE SECOND PHASE of the Horomatangi Street and Ruapehu Street intersection will get underway from Tuesday February 2.

This will include the finishing touches to the roundabout and the four corners including landscaping, seating and paving.

Project manager Darren Penketh said the work would begin on the eastern (school) side of the intersection and progress over a 12 week period.

"We will ensure minimal disruption over this time, including aiming to have all roads remaining open during the day.

"We're asking motorists to be careful and slow down, as our contractors will be working in the area, with small shoulders of the road closed, but roads remaining open to through-traffic," he said.

"Thank you to everyone – particularly affected businesses – for your patience while we have worked to transform this area," Mr Penketh said.

The work is part of the government-funded Taupō Town Centre Transformation project which aims to ensure the continued and sustainable growth and development of Taupō's town centre, with a focus on the needs of our community. It will transform our public places into spaces that attract people to spend time and invest in the town centre. It will also deliver on the community's aspirations for an attractive town centre with shared streets focused on the needs of pedestrians and cyclists
