MANGAKINO LOCAL IS PARKS PERSON OF THE YEAR

TAUPŌ DISTRICT COUNCIL Parks and Reserves team member Rui Kohiti has been awarded the prestigious Parks Person of the Year Award by Recreation Aotearoa.

This award recognises excellence in contributing to the community and environment at a national level. Rui was also the recipient of the 2021 Taupō District Council Kaitiaki O Te Tau, Ranger of the Year Award, for great work in our district.

Parks manager (open spaces) Andrew Moor said Rui's Recreation Aotearoa award was a well-deserved accolade for a greatly-valued member of the Parks and Reserves team.

"Rui has only been with us for three years but he has proven to be a real asset to us and the Mangakino/Pouakani area.

"Rui completed his National Certificate in Sports Turf Management Level 3 this year, and has begun studying towards Level 4, and he has applied a lot of what he's learnt there in his work for council. He has been instrumental in our 10,000 Trees Project, which focuses on the restoration and revegetation of reserve land throughout the Mangakino/Pouakani and Tongariro/ Tūrangi areas and has been behind some innovative work on the use of natural and organic fertilisers," Mr Moor said.

"But I think the award really recognises the incredible engagement Rui has with our community. For example, he has been involved extensively with the Pouakani Totara, New Zealand's largest, and possibly oldest Totara tree, which is on privately-owned Māori land but is open to the public to access. Rui has taken various school and community groups to view the tree, and Rui uses the tree to relay the messages of kaitiakitanga and manaakitanga.

"Rui himself embodies these concepts and the effect he has on others with him is really clear. He's a team player, who's always willing to share his knowledge with colleagues or the community alike."

Rui said it was humbling to be considered for the national award.

"Receiving this tohu is a real honour, and I'd like to thank the Parks team for nominating me – and the community for their support."

KINLOCH WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT UP AND RUNNING

COUNCILLORS, STAFF, CONTRACTORS and subcontractors gathered at the new Kinloch Wastewater Treatment Plant last Monday for its official opening.

Mayor David Trewavas cut the ribbon and thanked everyone who made this project happen despite Covid-19 disruptions.

"The new treatment plant is going to be a real asset for Kinloch." Mr Trewavas said. "It'll not only mean a much more resilient system for the community but also future-proofs our wastewater system in this rapidly-growing part of our district."

The new plant has been built to cater for the development of Kinloch so that as the village grows only simple upgrades will be required to expand the plant's processing capacity. Infrastructure manager Denis Lewis thanked all involved, particularly Jason Ewert, who had been instrumental in seeing the project through.

"This has been a real team effort in very trying times with council staff and local contractors making sure the outcome is excellent."

Council has installed an underground irrigation system at Kinloch Village Golf Course that takes the treated water and uses it to irrigate the fairways.

Mr Lewis said this was a win-win as it also helps reduce the golf course's water consumption.
